Denial of Credit/Retention vs. Truancy

 Two separate processes for Denial of Credit/Retention (Bulletin 741) vs.
Truancy (ACT 745/644)

- Absences are in four distinct categories:
 - Exempted, excused
 - Non-exempted, excused
 - Non-exempted, unexcused
 - Non-exempted, suspensions

Type One: Exempted, excused

Example: Doctor/Dentist note

- Not considered when determining grade level promotion or high school credit or truancy
- Exempted absences:
 - Extended personal physical or emotion illness as verified by physician or nurse practitioner;
 - Extended hospital stay as verified by physician or dentist;
 - Extended recuperation from an accident as verified by a physician, dentist or nurse practitioner;
 - Extended contagious disease with the immediate family as verified by a physician or dentist;
 - Visitation with an Armed Forces parent who has been deployed to a combat zone
 - Observance of special and recognized holidays of the student's own faith;
 - Educational travel prior to trip;
 - Death in the immediate family;
 - Court mandated orders;
 - Exclusions;
 - Days absent between recommendation for expulsion and original hearing date

Type Two: Non-exempted, excused

Example: parent notes

- Do not use these to determine truancy.
- Count these in the determination of grade level promotion or high school credits.
- Make-up work should be provided.

Type Three: Non-exempted, Unexcused Absences

Examples: no note, note turned in after two days of return, or skipping

- Use these to determine truancy.
- Count these in the determination of grade level promotion or high school credits.
- Make-up work should not be provided.

Type Four: Non-exempted, suspension

Example: disciplinary consequence

- Do not use these to determine truancy.
- Count these in the determination of grade level promotion or high school credits.
- Make-up work should follow your school policy.

Denial of Credit or Retention

Denial of Credit – Bulletin 741

- Types of Absences that count in Denial of Credit/Retention
 - Type Two: Non-exempted, excused
 - Type Three: Non-exempted, unexcused
 - Type Four: Non-exempted, Suspensions

- Number of Absences
 - High School 5 or more absences per semester
 - K-8 10 or more absences per year

Seat time

- For all absences with the exception of exempted, excused absences, students must make up seat time for absences over the 10 day limit for grades (K-8) and absences over the 5 day limit for grades (9-12).
- Students who exceed the attendance regulation at the end of the year/semester by virtue of noncompliance either by absences or failure to make up seat time should be denied credit/retained.
- Summer school can be used in K-8 to make up seat time.

Truancy

Type of Absence for Truancy – ACT 745/644

The only type of absence that determines truancy is Type Three: non-exempted, unexcused.
